The skills and experience Charlie brings to us will no doubt further enrich our lives here at Christ Church. ## February Vestry Meeting Highlights

- The vestry met on February 25 at 6:00pm, beginning with a supper and discussion with the Rev. Charlie Knuth, our incoming rector.
- Tina Monreal presented the annual Parochial Report. Of particular note was the average weekly attendance of Sunday worship increased from 124 in 2023 to 137 in 2024, even though we were without a full-time rector. The Parochial Report was approved by the vestry.

Dear Christ Church,

I am honored and delighted to have been called as your next rector.

My name is Charlie, and I am a child of the West, originally from Salt Lake City, Utah. I've been in church ministry for 12 years and a priest for 8, serving in the dioceses of Utah, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Northern California. Since March 2020, I have had the privilege of serving as rector of All Saints, Columbia Falls in the Flathead Valley of Northwest Montana (about 10 miles from Glacier National Park).

I am married to Mikayla Dunfee, whom I met at the sacred mating grounds of Yale Divinity School. She currently serves as Montana's canon to the ordinary, as well as rector of a small parish just two miles from the Canadian border. Our family is rounded out by Ana Magdalena, our keen and curious toddler, and our faithful dog, Lulu.



As a young adult, I “returned” to the Episcopal Church in search of a quiet and stable place to think and make sense of the world. Instead, I found life—abundant life. I discovered, and continue to find, profound joy in a vibrant relationship with Jesus, especially as he is revealed to us in the breaking of the bread.

I am a tongue-in-cheek sectarian who believes that when you bring together Anglican liturgy and evangelical preaching, you get the closest thing to ecclesiastical perfection this side of the Last Trumpet. I love our tradition's comprehension, its liturgical and musical richness, its sacramentality and reverence for the material world, and its deep commitment to social justice and acts of mercy.

I have a particular passion for ministry with children, youth, and young adults, having served in the Episcopal Service Corps and as a youth minister in metro Boston. I love leading worship that is both traditional and transformative—comforting and inspiring in equal measure. I strive to create programs that cultivate curiosity, creativity, and connection. I preach sermons that are short, playful, and employ humor, yet take sin and Christ's redemptive work seriously.



Your search committee, wardens, vestry, and clergy have represented you faithfully and done yeoman's work over the past year. I am very grateful for their ministry. Your bishop and colleagues in ministry also hold you in high esteem. You are known as "The Resurrection Church," and resiliency is one of your defining features—something that came up time and again in your materials. I know firsthand the power of a faith community that embraces bold (and sometimes uncomfortable) risks, grounded in a deep understanding of who they are and a steadfast trust in who God has called them to be.

I am so excited to get to know you, the staff, and our shared context for ministry.

In the meantime, I will be joining you in prayer each Sunday via the livestream.

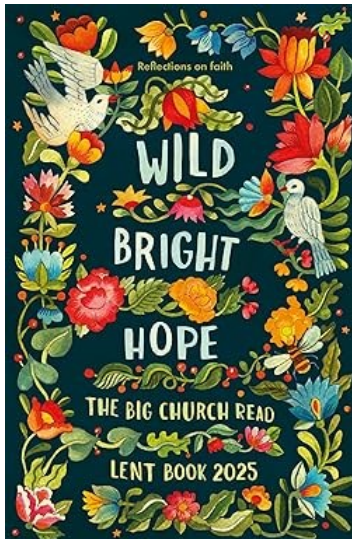

Our February was quite busy at Christ Church. Our Young Choristers not only sang Evensong at Trinity Cathedral but they participated in Treblefest. If you were to add up the number of pieces the choristers sang between those two events, you would get close to 20 different musical pieces. Both events showed the Diocese that we have a strong chorister program, only one of two in this Diocese. In addition, it showed that children at Christ Church have a place of leadership. In Evensong, they lead the service. That is a huge responsibility but also it sets an example: children have a place in the church beyond just the pew. I was so proud of their leadership. We are so blessed with great choirs here at Christ Church, but I would also like to remind you that the largest choir in the church is the congregation. We are here to offer our praise to God.

The first Sunday in Lent we sing the Great Litany in procession to start our travels together this Lent 2025. We have traveled through Lent before but yet every Lent seems to be different. How will your Lent differ from last year? As a church that emphasizes the common worship, we travel this Lent with our friends at our side. For me, I find church to be a grounding experience, especially in times like Advent and Lent. Church services give me time to recharge my battery, give me renewed purpose, and remind me of my humble humanity. I look forward to being with all of you this Lenten season.

### PRACTICING LENT AT HOME

Talking to children about Lent can be tricky. A good place to start is by reminding our children that Lent is a season when we make an effort to live the way God wants us to by praying and acting loving to other people. Traditionally, people have given up something to practice relying on God and developing discipline. While encouraging children to join in this practice can be meaningful, it is important to properly explain to your children why we do this. Help them to understand we give up something to help us grow in gratitude for all that we have and to help us focus on God. In addition to giving up something, suggest a correlating practice to add in. If your child chooses to give up a particular treat, set aside money that would be spent on that treat to give to those in need. Or if you decide to limit screen time, use the time that would have been spent in front of the TV to read Bible stories or about people of faith.

Here are some other ideas to make your Lent at home meaningful and intentional:

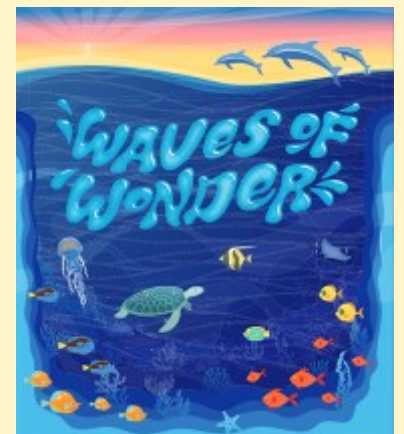
- Make Pretzels: Pretzels are a Lenten food. Early Christians would pray by crossing their arms over their chest with their hands to their shoulders. As part of their Lenten fast, they made bread with only flour, salt, and water. In the 600s, a monk made the bread fun for local children he taught as a reward and created the pretzel as a symbol of arms folded in prayer.
- Take virtual tour of Jerusalem [here](https://www.amazingjerusalem.com/trip/virtual-tour-jerusalem-old-city/) (<https://www.amazingjerusalem.com/trip/virtual-tour-jerusalem-old-city/>)
- Bake hot crossed buns--another Lenten food. This traditional food is served at the end of the Lenten season. The cross on the bun signifies the crucifixion of Christ and the spices used in the bun are reminiscent of the ones used in preparing his body for burial.

### SAVE THE DATE: VBS AUGUST 11-15

Mark your calendars and get ready for a fun week of faith and fellowship at Vacation Bible School where we'll let waves of wonder wash over us as we get out into God's creation this summer! Kids will be inspired by the beauty and majesty of what God has made.

At *Waves of Wonder* VBS, children will explore scriptures in which God provides water for plants, animals, and people. They will visit the wilderness and miraculously receive water from a rock. They will take a boat ride with Jesus and weather a wavy storm, and even imagine a new heaven and a new earth where all are invited to receive God's life-giving water.

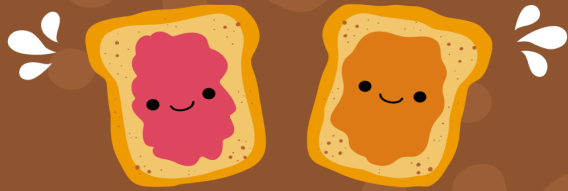
Through worship and drama, Bible study, art and science explorations, and active games, children will deepen their understanding of the importance of water and be invited to join God in caring for this precious natural resource!

## Get to know The Carpenters

What is SWAGELOK and what does it have to do with Christ Church? SWAGELOK is a multi-billion dollar global company with headquarters in Solon. It was founded in Cleveland in **1947!** It makes fluid systems, products, and assemblies, sold in **70 countries**. The name refers to a special fitting system that locks tubes and valves in place.

Deb Carpenter was working for SWAGELOK in Houston, TX when she became a global manager for oil and gas fittings. She and Lee had been living in Houston for years, but they made the big move to northeast Ohio, with son Chip (7) and daughter Harriet (3) last year. They settled in Hudson, in a century home on Aurora Street. What a change from the busy metropolis of Houston to small town Hudson! They loved the downtown ambiance and sense of community. Although they miss the faraway grandparents, they have made good friends here.

Lee and Deb met at Texas A & M University. After a long distance courtship, they married in 2013, in a Methodist church. He was raised in the Church of Christ (Disciples) and she was a Roman Catholic. As is so often the case, they eventually found the Episcopal Church to be a great compromise.

Lee had worked for a food and beverage distributor, specializing in California wines. But when Deb accepted the global assignment, they realized that she would have lots of international travel. So Lee became the full-time father for Chip and Harriet. In fact, when we had the interview for this piece, Deb was in India for two weeks!



They found Christ Church shortly after their move last June. They love walking to church, even on an icy morning. Chip and Harriet enjoy the children’s program, including Lego church. Lee says that listening to the Word, the sermon, and the music is “a good start to the week.” They hope to become more involved, helping with coffee hour and volunteering.

The family loves attending sports events, cycling, and tennis. With his background in food and wines, Lee enjoys cooking and pairing wines with meals.

While thoroughly appreciating Peter’s leadership, they are excited to meet our next rector. When asked what improvements he could think of for Christ Church, seven-year-old Chip said, “Nothing! It’s perfect!”

On March 14, 2025 Catherine Lively will Ring The Bell with her medical team at Lurie Children's Hospital in Chicago.

Catherine is the granddaughter of Irene Gillette, who at age 12, was diagnosed with Leukemia (ALL) in November 2022.

In spite of the painful challenge of hard treatment, Catherine continued her studies at home and school when possible and is now a freshman at New Trier High School. She was brave, courageous and dedicated to healing.
